### **Program – Annual Picnic and Nature Walk at Wenonah Lake**

The June 13 meeting of the Gloucester County Nature Club will be our annual spring picnic. The picnic will be held this year at the Wenonah Lake. Attendees should bring a food item to share, and their own utensils, plates, and cups to cut down on the waste of disposables. As with all club functions, the picnic is open to the public so why not bring a friend? We hope you will join us for the picnic. After the picnic, we will enjoy a walk on the trails along the lake. Wenonah Lake was dammed in 1762 by Abraham Dilks to provide power for his grist mill that once stood on Maple St on the lake's southern end. The lake is one of the few remaining swimming lakes in South Jersey. The woodlands

surrounding the lake are part of the Wenonah Conservation Area. After the picnic we will stroll the woodland trails to look at the plant life and look and listen for birds. The area is botanically rich and diverse, and a haven for wildlife, including many song birds and a resident pair of Barred Owls.

**Directions:** Directions to Wenonah Lake are from our normal meeting place at the Wenonah Community Center: From the Community Center, go west on Mantua Ave. for 2 blocks. Turn right (north) onto Jefferson Ave and continue for ½ mile to the lake parking lot. Wenonah Lake is located at the northeast corner of N. Jefferson Ave. and Maple St.

### **Inversand Field Trip Notice**

The Gloucester County Nature Club will not be able to conduct the field trip to the paleontological dig at the Inversand quarry in Sewell that was scheduled for Monday June 17, 2013. ## **Bird Quest - May 4, 2013 (14 years)**



May 4<sup>th</sup>, 2013 may enter into the record books of the Bird Quest Annuals as the most perfect weather – ever – for a Bird Quest. Slightly cool in the morning, the bright sun shone all day with very few clouds to contrast the azure sky. The gentle breeze brought tantalizing smells of lilacs and ornamental pear tree while strong enough to keep the few bugs at bay. All agreed the weather was perfect all of nature was in balance. Well, almost all...

This year the birds seemed to prefer to stay to the South. It became clear to me when most groups in Bird Quest heard white-throated sparrows singing that the birds had not heeded the call of spring. There were fewer migrants to be found but that didn't stop anyone from enjoying the day and having some wonderful looks at some wonderful birds.

Over the past few years Bird Quest has raised over \$6,000 to be used to help with preservation of Maple Ridge – an old golf course. Many groups visited Maple Ridge on Bird Quest and the number of species there is impressive because of the open space that has become rare and valuable in Gloucester County. I'm happy to report that it looks like there will soon be a park at Maple Ridge. It isn't final but it seems to be very close. Everyone who participated in Bird Quest over the past few years has had a part in preserving Maple Ridge. So when you go out bird watching at Maple Ridge, know that the birds you see are there because you cared. Know that you had a part in saving the indigo buntings that build their nest all over the site and you had a part in freeing the land from houses, roads, and telephone poles. I thank you but so will the children of Gloucester County for many years to come.

Our winning team, the Wenonah Warblers, this year saw 77 species. This is the first time the Wenonah Warblers participated in Bird Quest and the team spans three generations making it a perfect example of what Bird Quest and the Nature Club hope to promote – families spending time in nature. They certainly knew their birds and where to find them. Pulling all the lists of birds seen from all participants a total of 109 bird species were seen in the five hours that day.

Everyone received our Bird Quest t-shirt with the theme as "Hungry Birds" a clever twist on the Angry Birds game. As part of the theme each participant received a simple bird feeder and a pack of seeds with

some information about feeders, seeds, and how to feed the birds. All participants (walks, teams, and the two buses) met at Scotland Run Park for lunch and some wonderful prizes.

I look forward to seeing everyone next year – May 3, 2014 at our 15th annual Bird Quest. Yes, for 15 years we have been welcoming the spring with our first glimpses of the birds returning to Gloucester County. We would like to make 15 years special. Join us and spread the word.

- During courtship, a cedar waxwing pair may repeatedly pass a flower petal or insect back and forth.
- White-tailed deer are giving birth. The young fawns lie down and "freeze" when threatened.
- Longest day of the year is June 21.
- Pond turtles are digging nests and laying eggs, which will hatch in 80 to 90 days.
- Mountain laurel in bloom.
- Herons can be found roosting with young in marshes at the shore.
- Wood duck and mallard ducklings hatch and venture forth.
- Canada geese begin molting.
