<u>Field Trip – Natural History at Cedar Lake</u> Sunday, July 10, 9:30 AM to Noon

Leaders: Karl Anderson and Gale Cannon

There is something for everybody at the Cedar Lake Wildlife Management Area. We should see a few birds, some reptiles and amphibians, and (weather permitting) some dragonflies and butterflies. Depending on water levels, we could see over a hundred species of plants, many of them pine barrens specialties. Some will be in bloom. Be prepared for possible damp walking, and have insect repellant.

Directions: Cedar Lake WMA is on Jackson Road in Monroe Township and straddles the border between Gloucester and Atlantic Counties. From the intersection of Route 47 and Coles Mill Road in Franklinville, go east on Coles Mill Road for about 7.7 miles to Jackson Road. Turn right (south) on Jackson Road and go about 3.0 miles to the parking area which will be on the right (and is actually in Atlantic County). There are other ways to get there, see your road maps.

<u>Field Trip - Riverwinds Scenic Trail Butterfly Walk</u> Saturday, August 13, 9:30 AM to Noon

This will be a leisurely walk around the trail with a possible side trail to the center field. The trail is usually mowed, but spray pants and socks with insect repellant.

In addition to insect repellant, bring close focusing binoculars, plenty of water, hat, and shoes that can get wet or a little muddy. If there is interest we may drive down to the Community Center to check out the weedy field or walk near the Delaware River. There are no public restrooms here, but stop at nearby National Park if needed. I will have a butterfly field guide. Trip is cancelled if rainy. Any questions, call 856-546-5471 prior to the 13th, or my cell 856-534-5597 day of the trip.

Directions: See your guide to the <u>Natural Places of Gloucester County</u>. Or, from the intersection of Delaware Avenue and Broad Street in the center of Woodbury, go west on Delaware Avenue for about 2.2 miles. The entrance to the trail will be on the right, about 0.3 mile after you cross Grove Street.

We'll explore what is in, on, under and around the creek as we walk in the water. We'll look for fish, frogs, turtles, mussels, animal prints, flowers, birds and more. Wear appropriate water shoes or old sneakers to walk <u>in</u> the water and bring repellent. <u>See below for dates, times, and locations.</u>

Fri., July 15th at 10:30 AM in Ceres Park, Mantua

This park is a great one for summer hikes since its tall trees provide lots of shade. There is easy access to a stream after a short hike to the corner of this lovely park.

Directions: From Rt 322 take Lambs Rd (635) to Pitman-Barnsboro Rd (553Alt). Turn left onto Rt553A. Watch for Ceres Park sign on your left after crossing over Rt 55. We'll meet in the parking lot.

Fri., Aug. 19th at 10:30 AM in Pitman

This stream walk is an old favorite, we do this one most years and it is always filled with a surprise or two.

Directions: From Broadway in Pitman go west on Holly Avenue. Turn right at Elm Street (the 4th street on the right; before Alcyon Lake). Make the 2nd left onto Albert Ave. Proceed to end of Albert. Parking is on left, behind Memorial School. We'll meet in the parking lot.

Natural Events for the month of July

- Blueberries ripen in early July.
- Bog asphodel, now found only in New Jersey, blooms in early July in Pinelands fens.
- The first brood of monarch butterflies is emerging from their chrysalis.
- Raccoons, skunks, and opossums are digging up and eating turtle eggs.
- Breeding and nesting season for birds ends this month except for goldfinches and late bluebirds
- Thistle plants are beginning to seed; goldfinches gather thistledown for nesting materials
- Listen for the feeding calls of young barred and great horned owls.
- Yellow warblers begin to head south in July; migration is complete in August.

Natural Events for the month of August

- Perseid meteor shower August 12.
- Sweet goldenrod, early goldenrod, cardinal flower, and other late-summer flowers bloom.
- Sweet pepperbush in bloom.
- Purple martins begin roosting in phragmites along the Maurice River near Port Elizabeth in preparation for their southern migration. Peak numbers usually occur around the third week in August.
- Red knots pass through New Jersey again on their southward migration to Chile. Adults are still in breeding plumage.
- Fall raptor migration begins in mid-August with small numbers of several species, including American kestrels, ospreys and bald eagles.
- Gray squirrels give birth to second brood.
- Early warblers migrating south through New Jersey.
- American goldfinches finish nesting late in this month
- Second brood of hummingbirds begin to appear at feeders.
- Birds are feeding on fruits of flowering dogwood trees.
