Paul Stankard is an artist of international reputation and renown. His glass sculptures have been exhibited and admired in museums and galleries around the globe. Those who have been fortunate enough to have seen his work cannot but marvel at the exquisite detail of blossom or leaf lovingly recreated in glass. His is an artistic vision that is intimately connected to the natural world and infused with a love and knowledge of our native plants that inspire so much of his work. Thus he is both artist and naturalist. Paul will tell us this evening about his art, his craft and the personal journey of his life. Poet as well as sculptor, he will share with us his vision. Paul lives and works in Mantua, NJ and is truly one of Gloucester County's and the world's living treasures.

### **Field Trip – Birds and Butterflies at Amico Island Park, Delran Township, NJ**

**Saturday, September 15<sup>th</sup>, 9:00AM; leaving Timberline 8:00AM**

Amico Island Park is a 55-acre peninsula featuring a diverse collection of habitats and terrain. With upland forests, freshwater ponds and wetlands, river shoreline and meadows, we will enjoy a rustic natural setting at the confluence of the Rancocas Creek and Delaware River. The various paths are fairly short and are paved and level. Adequate parking and restrooms are available. The park recommends wearing light colored clothes and bringing insect repellent. Bring a lunch as plenty of picnic areas are available.



Fall migration will be underway and hopefully we will see migrating southbound warblers; fresh water ponds and wetlands will offer glimpses of egrets, herons, and shore birds. We will try our hand at identifying various butterflies in the park.

We will be meeting at Timberline Shopping Center on Woodbury Glassboro Rd in Sewell at 8:00AM to carpool north for about an hour to Amico Island Park. If you would rather travel on your own, you can meet us there at 9:00AM by following these directions:

**Directions:** Take Rt. 130 North to Chester Ave. in Delran. Take Chester Avenue west to St. Mihiel Dr. (which is also called River Rd.). Turn Left onto St. Mihiel Dr. Take the third right onto Norman Ave.

## **Conservation Corner - Wake Up Call** by Loretta Dunne

Walking at Riverwinds, which is close to my home in Woodbury, I frequently hear the song of the field sparrow – I can identify this one easily because it really does sound like a ping-pong ball hitting a table. And the truth is, I usually think, oh another field sparrow and try to find birds that excite me more.

That was before I read the disturbing report, “Common Birds in Decline” that Audubon recently published. This report indicates that even the most common birds are disappearing. Using citizen science, including data from nation-wide Christmas Bird Counts, the population of common birds since 1967 was examined. The field sparrow, that I ignored so blandly, is down 68%.

Although previously, there have been a lot of emphasis on warblers, who need to depend on habitats in both the tropics and the north, it seems that all birds are at risk. You might think that this is not exactly news. Yes, we have realized that the numbers are way down, but seeing the actual percentages is shocking. According to the report, “Since 1967 the average population of the common birds in steepest decline has fallen by 68 percent; some individual species nose-dived as much as 80 percent. All 20 birds on the national Common Birds in Decline list lost at least half their populations in just four decades.”

Walking at Riverwinds, it is possible to hear the bird that is number one on the Common Birds in Decline list, the Northern Bobwhite. They are down 82 %. The nine other birds considered common that have had the most precipitous declines are the evening grosbeak, northern pintail, greater scaup, boreal chickadee, eastern meadowlark, common tern, loggerhead shrike, field sparrow and grasshopper sparrow.

What can we do about it? The Audubon report suggest a number of steps: preserve farmlands, save grasslands, conserve wetlands, support sustainable forests, stop invasive species, halt global warming, patrol (and protect) beaches, monitor feeders (keep them clean) and get out and count. The most important step you can take from the Audubon list of what you can do is their “Take our cue” action. Make this report your personal wake up call. Although, as members of the nature club, we all do have a level of awareness and do our share to protect the environment, we can all do more. Get out there and fight for the future of these once common birds so that they do not turn up a few years from now on the endangered list and so future generations can hear that sweet whistle of the bob-white as it walks through the underbrush. Many of these birds are part of our landscape here in Gloucester County. Let’s keep it that way.

- Robins begin to join together in large flocks
- Most hummingbirds depart by the end of the month
- Bats busy feeding – building fat reserves for hibernation and migration.
- Broad-winged hawk migration peaks in mid-month - plan a visit to a hawk lookout.
