**Program – Picnic at Scotland Run Park (Clayton) & Awakening Spirits: The Art and Science of Tracking**

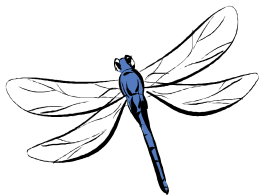


The Tracker School was founded in 1978 by Tom Brown Jr, one of America's most renowned trackers, and wilderness survival experts. Bill Marple will speak about the philosophy of tracking which is offered at Tracker School, and its origins and evolution from the Apache scouts of the past. He will examine the art and science of tracking in its naturalist and philosophic contexts and also discuss the use of tracking in forensic investigations and his work as director of Tracker Search and Forensic Investigation, a non-profit that offers the service of tracking to the community, and offers instruction in tracking to law enforcement, SAR, homeland security, and military organizations. The program will also offer some hands on tracking instruction and experience.

**Reminder: Picnic begins at 6:00 PM with the program following at approximately 7:00 PM**

**Directions to Scotland Run Park** From Delsea Drive (Rt. 47) in Clayton turn east on Academy Street (Rt. 619). Continue for 2.2 miles and cross Fries Mill Road. The entrance to the park will be on your left.

**Field Trip – Brendan Byrne State Forest, Burlington County NJ**  
**Saturday, June 12<sup>th</sup>, 9:00 AM to mid-afternoon**  
**Trip Leader: Karl Anderson**



Visit several plant communities of the Pine Barrens, including cedar swamps, upland pine and oak forests, and lakeshores, for general nature study including plants, birds, and dragonflies, and to learn something about the ecology of the region. If time permits we will make a brief botanical foray to Whitesbog. During the course of the day we should see half a dozen species of carnivorous plants, and perhaps an orchid or two.

**Directions:** Meet at the forest office, which is about one mile east of the intersection of Routes 70 and 72 at the “Four Mile” traffic circle. From Woodbury, take Rte. 295 north to Route 70. Go east on Route 70 for approximately 22 miles to the intersection with Route 72. Go about 2/3 of the way around the circle, and continue east on Route 70 for another mile. Look for a Brendan Byrne State Forest sign on the right. Turn in and continue a short distance to the office. Bring binoculars, lunch, beverage, field guides, insect repellent. Have sufficient fuel in your car to drive about twenty miles during the day, some of it on unpaved (but good) sand roads. For additional information phone the leader at (856) 845-7075.

**Bird Quest 2010 (11 years) Wrap-Up** by Brian Hayes

When I think about the World Series of Birding I’m struck by the longevity of that event. For 27 years they have consistently produced one of the top birding events in the world. While the Gloucester County Bird Quest isn’t in the same league as the World Series of Birding, it is impressive none the less.

As we start our second decade, Bird Quest continues to provide a wonderful value to the residents of Gloucester County and the South Jersey area with the additional benefit of highlighting the wonderful diversity of bird species we have in Gloucester County.

Why do we have this impressive array of avian species? Because we still have some of the habitat needed to support these flying colors of spring. But, I am worried. We lose more and more habitat here in Gloucester County and the Country each year. I’m hoping in the next year we can preserve another small area in Gloucester County – the old Maple Ridge golf course. If we don’t succeed then we will have lost just one more piece of open space but I think we need to draw the line somewhere. What we can gain is the knowledge that the same birds we see today will be around for our children and grand children.

Everyone knows the saying from the movie “Field of Dreams” – “If you build it, they will come.” But I would turn this saying around and say – “If you build it, the birds will be gone.” Help us preserve it. But more to come on that in future newsletters ... For now, here is the update on Bird Quest.

We had another fantastic Bird Quest!!

Our winning team saw 74 species while the event’s combined participants saw 122. We had 250 people registered for the event and Woodford Cedar Run Refuge with their live birds back at the park was a great cap to a wonderful day.

Everyone received our Bird Quest t-shirt, a poster on bird migration in Gloucester County and had a nice lunch. This poster is a great addition to the t-shirt and another helpful educational tool. In addition, we had three full buses this year; with one bus filled with girl scouts who had a wonderful time.

I look forward to seeing everyone next year – May 7, 2011 at our 12th annual Bird Quest. We hope to keep the momentum going from this year and make next year’s Quest even better.

- During courtship, a cedar waxwing pair may repeatedly pass a flower petal or insect back and forth.
- White-tailed deer are giving birth. The young fawns lie down and "freeze" when threatened.
- Longest day of the year is June 21.
- Pond turtles are digging nests and laying eggs, which will hatch in 80 to 90 days.
- Mountain laurel in bloom.
- Herons can be found roosting with young in marshes at the shore.
- Wood duck and mallard ducklings hatch and venture forth.
- Canada geese begin molting.
