Program – <u>Mammals and Mammal Skulls of New Jersey</u> Thursday, January 11th at 7:00 PM at EIRC, Sewell

New Jersey has at least 48 species of terrestrial mammals (not including man) but this is in general an overlooked and unstudied group of organisms. Few mammalogists elect to pursue their calling in New Jersey! Most of our mammals are small, many are nocturnal, almost all of them are smart enough to keep away from people, and thus even some rather common species are

rarely seen in the wild. But they do leave traces of their presence, including skeletal materials, which can be picked up in the woods and fields or found in owl pellets. This slide program will introduce some of these local mammals, match them with photographs of their skulls, and point out what to look for when faced with an unknown specimen. Karl spent a few years picking up and processing roadkills, so a few real skulls from his collection will be on display. And if you have any unidentified skulls lying around the house by all means bring them in and we'll see if we can put a name to them!

Children and adults will get some facts and some fiction about our old friend, Luna. We'll also take a look at some constellations in the winter sky. This is a weather-related event and is entirely dependent on a clear sky. So if it



is cloudy, we will try again on Wednesday, January 23th at 7PM. The park is located off Holly Ave., on the west side of Alcyon Lake. Drive through the gates and park on the upper level near the playground.
