Horseshoe Crabs are some of the strangest creatures on earth. Not really crabs at all, they are more closely related to the Trilobites that swam in Paleozoic seas. Related to scorpions, ticks and land spiders, horseshoe crabs have their own classification (Class Merostomata). Horseshoe crabs, common along the Delaware Bay coast, have evolved little in the last 250 million years. Still, they have survived because of their hard, curved shells, which have made it difficult for predators to overturn them and expose their soft, vulnerable underbellies. The horseshoe crab has also survived because it can go a year without eating and endure extreme temperatures and salinity. The Delaware Bay region is home to the largest population of the American horseshoe crab (Limulus polyphemus), which is found along the western shores of the Atlantic Ocean from Maine to the Yucatan. Each spring the eggs of spawning Horseshoe Crabs along the Delaware Bay provide an essential food source for migrating shore birds, including the imperiled Red Knot on its extraordinary 12,000 mile journey. Because of their critical importance to migratory shore birds, of Gov. Corzine has recently banned commercial harvesting of Horseshoe Crabs in New Jersey.

Our presenter will be Sue Anne Slotterback, Program Director for New Jersey Audubon's Nature Center at Cape May. Sue's presentation tonight will be an adult (but kid friendly) version of the Horseshoe Crab Lab program she presents in area schools. We hope to have live specimens as part of the presentation. Come and see one of natures most unusual animals and learn how even these unlikely creatures play their part in the interconnectedness of the natural world.



**PLANT SALE!** It's that time again! Spring is here - even though the weather left us wondering for a while - time to be in our gardens, getting them ready for the warm weather season. Please mark them carefully, though, so we keep the mystery plants to a minimum. The Plant Sale will be held just before the May meeting. It will start at **6:00pm** in the EIRC parking lot. It is open to the public so please tell family and friends.

## Field Trip – <u>Bowman's Hill Wildflower Preserve</u>, New Hope, PA

Sunday, May 18<sup>th</sup>, 8:30 A.M. to early afternoon

Preserve Admission Fee: \$5 Trip Leader: Rich Dilks

Bowman's Hill is a 134 acre state wildflower preserve along the upper Delaware River, just south of New Hope, PA. It is dedicated to the preservation, enjoyment and appreciation of the native wildflowers and flowering shrubs of Pennsylvania. It is a "natural garden" with trails through diverse woodland and meadow habitats and contains a small pond, wetlands, streams and the flowing waters of Pitcock Creek. We will be looking at some of the late spring blooming wildflowers such as Yellow Lady's Slipper, Eastern Columbine, Golden Alexander, Shooting Star and Golden Star as well as flowering shrubs and ferns. Bowman's Hill is also a good birding area, so you may wish bring binoculars on our walk. Also on the site are a visitor's center with a bird observation area, a small natural history museum and gift shop. Native plants (green house grown) will also be for sale as the preserve. Near by, on the top of Bowman's Hill, is Bowman's Tower. You may take an elevator ride (for a small fee) to the top for a lovely view of the Delaware River and the surrounding countryside. There is a picnic area and rest rooms at the preserve for those who wish to bring a lunch and beverage.

**Directions:** Those who wish to car pool will meet at Timberline Shopping Center on Rt 553 in Sewell at 8:30 A.M. Due to road closings in PA, the best route to Bowman's Hill is on the NJ side. Take I-295 North all the way until it becomes I-95 South above Trenton (you're actually going east here). Take I-95 South to Rt. 29 North, just before I-95 crosses the Delaware. Take Rt 29 north to Lambertville. At Lambertville, turn left onto Bridge Street (Rt 179). Cross the bridge to New Hope and make an immediate left onto Main Street, (Rt. 32) which becomes River Rd. Continue south for 2 miles. The entrance to the wildflower preserve is on the right. Travel time from Sewell is about one hour and twenty minutes. We hope to arrive at Bowman's Hill about 10:00 A.M.

## Field Trip Report - Salem County Birding - April 12

On this trip, nine members of the GCNC joined a similarly-sized contingent from the Rancocas Nature Center, for a spectacular birding tour of several Salem County sites. The leader was Lloyd Shaw. Locations visited included the Pedricktown Marshes, Featherbed Lane (just west of its junction with Kings Highway), and Mannington Marsh. A good variety of shorebirds, waterfowl, raptors, and passerines were seen. Some species of particular interest were pectoral sandpiper, greater and lesser yellowlegs, glossy ibis, eastern meadowlark, snipe, kestrel, palm warbler, great horned owl (on a nest) and bald eagle (also on a nest). In addition to birds, roadsides were adorned with veronicas, violets, mustards, dandelions, and other mostly non-native but attractive plants. The weather was cool and dry except for one brief shower.

## Conservation Corner - Court Upholds Delaware's Right to Veto the BP Natural Gas Pier

The Supreme Court ruled on April 1st that the state of Delaware has the right to veto the proposed British Petroleum Natural Gas pier planned for Crown Landing in Logan Township, Gloucester County. According to the Delaware News Journal, in an April 1st article by Jeff Montgomery, "Justice Ruth Bader Ginsburg, writing for a 6-2 majority, branded New Jersey's arguments in authorizing the pier over Delaware's objections 'implausible,' and said the two states share authority to regulate construction on the river in areas where the full width of the waterway lies inside Delaware." Although BP plans to fight on, this decision is a major set-back. The environmental groups who were concerned about the BP plan, such as Delaware Audubon Society and the Delaware Sierra Club, are very pleased with the decision. The article reported a statement made by John A. Hughes, secretary of Delaware's Department of Natural Resources and Environmental Control. "Our staff very correctly defined this facility as a bulk transfer facility specifically, clearly and unequivocally forbidden under the Coastal Zone Act."

## Reminder – Keep up the pressure!

As you are all probably aware, the Governor's proposed budget includes a 15% cut to the NJ Department of Environmental (DEP) Protection Budget. The DEP announced that **9 of our state parks**, which represent **20**% of our state parks, will be closed.

Please contact the governor and your state representatives in the assembly and senate. Let them all know how you feel about these cuts. Don't know how to reach them? See below.

#### What You Need:

- 3. Hold your crayon or pencil on its side and rub it across the paper where it covers the object you selected

For fun, you can change the colors and make some rubbings with a single color and others with different colors together.



## The 2008 Gloucester County Bird Quest: Saturday May 3, 2008

The Gloucester County Nature Club and its co-sponsors invite people of all ages to participate in the 2008 (ninth annual) Gloucester County Bird Quest. The 2008 Bird Quest will take place on Sat., May 3, 2008 from 7 AM to 12 noon throughout Gloucester County.

During this time, teams visit parks and natural sites in Gloucester County to find as many different bird species as they can. The Quest is:

- A way to discover Gloucester County's parks and natural areas
- A way to discover the unique birds that live in and through our county
- An opportunity to learn how to identify birds by sight, sound, behavior, and habitat
- An opportunity to have fun with family, friends, and colleagues
- A light-hearted competition



We encourage you to organize your own Quest team with colleagues, friends, and/or family. Last year's Gloucester County Bird Quest attracted several hundred participants made up of families, friends, teachers, school groups, scout troops, environmental commissions ... residents of Gloucester and neighboring counties. If you have participated in the past why not invite a friend or colleagues to join you for this year's Bird Quest! With support from Wheelabrator, LP of Gloucester County, the club will again operate two (free) guided buses for individuals unable to form their own team and who are willing to join a larger group. Our theme this year is "Natural Places of Gloucester County" and will be featured in a T-shirt designed by the club's own Gary Lizzi. A county map and other materials are provided to registered teams. A \$12 fee per participant helps to defray the cost of lunch, T-shirts, prizes etc.

#### **Natural Events for the month of May**

- Jack in the pulpit, pink lady's-slipper, and mayapple bloom by mid-May in the County's remnant woodlands.
- Early spring flowers such as spring beauty fade rapidly, as trees leaf out and shade the forest floor.
- Princess tree, or Paulownia (named after an 18th-Century Russian princess) blooms with large clusters of pale purple flowers. It's an invasive species but still very pretty.
- By late May, monarch butterflies arrive from the south and begin laying their eggs on newly emerged plants of common milkweed.
- Young rabbits, gray squirrels, and other small mammals are leaving their home nests. Drive carefully.
- Horseshoe crabs spawn on Delaware Bayshore beaches from late May to early June.
- Red knots arrive for their stop-over at the Delaware Bay area to double their weight on horseshoe crab eggs in preparation for their nonstop journey to Arctic breeding grounds.
