Field Trip – Birding and Kayaking in Greenwich **Saturday, July 13, 2013, 8:00 AM until mid-afternoon**

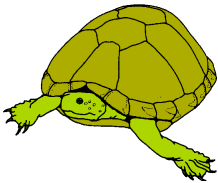
Join us for some birding and kayaking along Sand Ditch and White Sluice Race. Good kayaking trips are harder to find in Gloucester County with the increased beaver activity and all the winter storms (downed trees) this year. This waterway goes all the way to the Delaware River but has the benefit of not being tidal as it has flood gates on it making for an easy paddle downstream and back. We will look for eagles, osprey, muskrat, and keep a keen eye out for beaver too. Bring your own boat and a lunch, along with plenty of water, bug spray, and sunscreen.

Directions: From route 295, exit onto Tomlin Station Road (exit 14) and head west. You will pass the entrance to Greenwich Lake Park soon after exiting the highway. Continue a bit further 0.06 miles along Tomlin Station Road to a dirt parking lot on the left side of the road. This will be our put in for the trip.

July 2013 Stream Walk

Come with us on a Stream Walk on Wednesday, July 17 at 6:00 PM at Ceres Park, Mantua. We'll explore what is in, on, under and around the creek as we walk IN the water. We'll look for fish, frogs, turtles, mussels, animal prints, flowers, birds and more. Wear appropriate water shoes or old sneakers and bring insect repellent. Please NO flip flops.

Directions: From Rt 322 take Lambs Rd (635) to Pitman-Barnsboro Rd (553Alt). Turn left onto Rt553A. Watch for Ceres Park sign on your left after crossing over Rt 55. Meet in the parking lot..

Field Trip – Ceres Park County-Side Walk

Thursday, August 8, 2013 at 6:00 PM

Take a walk on the wild side of Ceres Park. Go on a walk guided by experts of this relatively unknown side of Ceres owned by Gloucester County that can be difficult to explore on your own. We will walk the park to

appreciate the natural wonders that Ceres offers as the “hidden gem” of Gloucester County parks -- abundant ferns, forest birds, wildlife and maybe even follow the rail bed of the now extinct West Jersey Mining Co. RR. Historically a marl mining site, this location shares a common heritage with the World Heritage green sand marl (glaucinite) pit mine in Mantua Township which is being called one of the most important paleontological locations on Earth. Sturdy shoes and bug spray are recommended.

Directions: From Rt 322 take Lambs Rd (635) to Pitman-Barnsboro Rd (553Alt). Turn left onto Rt553A. Watch for Ceres Park sign on your left after crossing over Rt 55. Meet in the parking lot, where we will carpool to the county-owned land.

Natural Events for the month of July

- Blueberries ripen in early July.
- Bog asphodel, now found only in New Jersey, blooms in early July in Pinelands fens.
- The first brood of monarch butterflies is emerging from their chrysalis.
- Raccoons, skunks, and opossums are digging up and eating turtle eggs.
- Breeding and nesting season for birds ends this month except for goldfinches and late bluebirds
- Thistle plants are beginning to seed; goldfinches gather thistleseed for nesting materials
- Listen for the feeding calls of young barred and great horned owls.
- Yellow warblers begin to head south in July; migration is complete in August

Natural Events for the month of August

- Perseid meteor shower - August 12.
- Sweet goldenrod, early goldenrod, cardinal flower, and other late-summer flowers bloom.
- Sweet pepperbush in bloom.
- Purple martins begin roosting in phragmites along the Maurice River near Port Elizabeth in preparation for their southern migration. Peak numbers usually occur around the third week in August.
- Red knots pass through New Jersey again on their southward migration to Chile. Adults are still in breeding plumage.
- Fall raptor migration begins in mid-August with small numbers of several species, including American kestrels, ospreys and bald eagles.
- Gray squirrels give birth to second brood.
- Early warblers migrating south through New Jersey.
- American goldfinches finish nesting late in this month
- Second brood of hummingbirds begin to appear at feeders.
- Birds are feeding on fruits of flowering dogwood trees.
