Program - Reptiles and Amphibians of Southern New Jersey

Southern New Jersey, with its diverse habitats of deciduous woodlands, oak-pine forest, freshwater wetlands, marshes and its marine and estuary environments, is home to a large and diverse population of reptiles and amphibians. New Jersey is home to 44 species of reptiles. That includes 19 species of turtles, from the common but beautiful eastern painted turtle to the rare and endangered bog turtle and Atlantic leatherneck. We have the



northern fence lizard and 2 species of skinks. Our snakes include the common eastern garter snake and the eastern hognose, who strikes in defense but almost never bites, and when all else fails, plays dead. South Jersey is home to the delicate and arboreal smooth green snake and in the pinelands you will find South Jersey's only pit viper, the endangered timber rattlesnake.



Unlike all other classes of vertebrates, all amphibians are carnivores. 16 species of salamanders and 16 species of frogs and toads are native to New Jersey. Our salamanders range from South Jersey's beautiful and endangered eastern tiger salamander to the more common redback salamander one can often find hiding under a woodland log. Our frogs include the well-known northern spring peeper, whose chorus from ponds and wetlands in April heralds the coming of spring, and the diminutive and endangered Pine Barrens tree frog. Frogs, like birds can be identified by their calls. The wood

frog sounds a bit like a quacking duck while the carpenter frog's call sounds like a carpenter hitting nails with a hammer. Tonight we welcome The Academy of Natural Sciences' Ned Gilmore, who will tell us about this diverse array of wildlife that surrounds us, their places and roles in the habitats where they live and how human activity is affecting the future for these animals.

Directions: The Holy Nativity Lutheran Church is located just off Rt 553 (Woodbury-Glassboro Rd.) immediately south of the traffic light at Mantua Ave. The church parking lot can be accessed by entrances on either Woodbury-Glassboro Road or Lenape Trail (first left off of Mantua Ave).

Natural Events for the month of October

- Pine Barrens gentian in bloom in the Pinelands.
- Goldenrods, asters, bonesets, and blazing star in bloom.
- Cranberry harvest in the Pinelands.
- Autumn colors peak in late October.
- The greatest variety of raptor migration comes in mid-October, with golden eagles, redshouldered hawks and more.

- Fox sparrows, one of the largest sparrows, are often seen under seed feeders during their autumn migration
- Wood ducks are migrating south
- Green-winged teals, one of the smallest dabbling ducks, are passing through the area as they
 migrate to the shore.
