Program – The Swamp Pink

At our November gathering we again welcome The South Jersey Land & Water Trust to the annual joint meeting of our two organizations. The November program will be a special presentation by noted New Jersey naturalist and nature photographer, Mike Hogan of the SJL&WT on his 20-year study of the endangered Swamp Pink. In his decades long effort to locate and map occurrence sites, Mike and the SJL&WT have collected critical data that will significantly assist with the protection and preservation of this unique wildflower species and its habitat.



Each spring in Southern New Jersey's forested wetlands one of the most unique and beautiful wildflowers in the eastern United States comes into bloom. Those fortunate enough to know where to look will find the Swamp Pink (Heloniasbullata) with its lovely cluster of pink flowers, with their striking blue anthers, rising on a single stem from a surrounding ring of basal leaves. It is a plant like no other, the only member of its genus. Once placed in the family Liliaceae (Lillies), it is now classified as belonging to the family Melanthiaceae (Bunch Flower Family). Its closest relative, Heloniopsis orientalis, is native to Japan. The Swamp Pink is federally listed as Threatened and state listed in New Jersey as Endangered. Its global ranking is G3 (Globally very rare and known for less than 100 locations). Its state ranking is S3 (Rare in NJ and known from less than 50 locations). The great majority of Swamp Pinks are found in central and southern New jersey with 70% to 90% of the global population occurring here. It is also found in Delaware, a small section of Maryland and at localized upland sites in Virginia and an area in the western Carolinas and Georgia. These are likely remnant populations of a historically larger range.

Join us and learn about this special wildflower so close to home and about the SJL&WT's excellent work to protect it.

<u>Directions:</u> The Holy Nativity Lutheran Church is located just off Rt 553 (Woodbury-Glassboro Rd.) immediately south of the traffic light at Mantua Ave. The church parking lot can be accessed by entrances on either Woodbury-Glassboro Road or Lenape Trail (first left off of Mantua Ave).

Field Trip - Birding at Riverwinds

Saturday, November 6, 8:30 AM to Noon

Join us for some fall birding at Riverwinds. We'll start at the Scenic Trail at 8:30 AM and walk through the varied habitats there. We'll be focusing on fall sparrows, hoping to see American tree sparrow, fox sparrow, and white-crowned sparrow, along with four or five other more common species. Time permitting, we'll also explore some little-known trails in different areas of the Riverwinds Complex looking for the many raptors that could be located there, including bald eagle, red-tailed hawk, red-shouldered hawk, and possible falcons as well, including American kestrel and peregrine. This will be an easy walk on mowed trails. Rest rooms are located in the Riverwinds main building.

Directions: See your guide to the *Natural Places of Gloucester County*. Or, from the intersection of Route 45 and Cooper Street/Delaware Street in the center of Woodbury, take Delaware Avenue west. In about two miles, cross Grove Street. Continue for another 0.3 mile, on what is then called Riverwinds Drive. Watch for a sign for the trail entrance, on the right.

Advance Notice - December Field Trip: Audubon Christmas Bird Count on Saturday, December 18

Please join us for the Christmas Bird Count as our December field trip. Many of you have joined us in the past and hope you will again. We always look forward to new participants as they add a breath of fresh air to the 'hunt'. Once again we will have area leaders for each zone of the Count. The leader will form a group(s) and travel their area to see and hear as many birds as possible documenting the' finds' as they go along. Some groups start "Owling" in the wee hours, others might get out there at daybreak. Start and finish times can be arranged with the leader. One can put in as much time as you wish. One does not need to be an 'expert' birder, quite the contrary. This citizen science exercise is for everyone, beginner to expert. For those who are unable to participate yet might be available to watch their feeders (providing your property is in the Count circle), you may count what you see in your yard and submit the information. I am hoping to have forms and count sheets at the next 2 meetings to distribute. Or you can phone me at 856-881-9262 and I would be more than happy to mail the info to you. It would be great to build on our core of feeder watchers. If you wish to go out on the Count and have not linked up with anyone, merely give me a call and I will place you with a group. That's how I got my start! This is a fun experience and an excuse to break away from the sometimes craziness of the season, to see some interesting and different territories and animals. Go south on Rt 553Alt for 1.6 miles. The park entrance will be on the left. There is a large paved parking area. Meet at the wildflower garden.

Project FeederWatch

Embrace the winter. Count feeder birds for science!

Ithaca, NY—What happens in the backyard should not stay in the backyard—at least when it comes to bird feeders. By sharing information about which birds visit their feeders between November and April, backyard bird watchers can help scientists track changes in bird numbers and movements from year to year, through Project FeederWatch, a citizen-science program from the Cornell Lab of Ornithology and Bird Studies Canada.

Project FeederWatch participants may begin collecting data as early as November 1. The season officially starts on November 1 and runs through early April. Taking part is easy. Anyone can count the numbers and kinds of birds at their feeders and enter their information on the FeederWatch website. Since 1987, more than 40,000 people from the United States and Canada have taken part in the project.

"To get the most complete picture of bird movements, we always need new sets of eyes to tell us what species are showing up at backyard feeders," says David Bonter, leader of Project FeederWatch. "Participants always tell us how much fun it is and how good it feels to contribute to our understanding of birds by submitting their sightings."

Project FeederWatch is for people of all ages and skill levels. To learn more and to sign up, visit www.feederwatch.org or call the Cornell Lab toll-free at 866-982-2473. In return for the \$15 fee (\$12 for Cornell Lab members) participants receive the FeederWatcher's Handbook, an identification poster of the most common feeder birds, a calendar, complete instructions, and Winter Bird Highlights, an annual summary of FeederWatch findings.



Kid's Corner - Create a "Treasure Chest"* by Deb Maka

We all have things that we want to carry with us and need someplace to store them. You can show your creativity and recycle at the same time by decorating an empty, metal, mint container to create you own "treasure chest". You can fill your "treasure chest" with what ever you'd like to bring with you. One example is to fill it with miniature versions of toys and games (i.e. dice, playing cards, toy cars, etc). Another option is to fill your container with fashion items like lip gloss and hair accessories.

What you need:

- a clean, empty, metal mint container
- lightweight paper (colored printer paper works well)
- craft glue
- markers

What you do:

- 1. Clean and dry an empty mint container
- 2. Trace the lid on lightweight paper and adhere it to the lid with craft glue
- 3. Decorate the lid with markers*
- 4. When finished decorating the container fill it with your "treasures"

Another option to decorate your container is to get an adhesive magnetic sheet. Stick white paper on the magnetic sheet. Then draw facial features (i.e. eyes, mouths, eye brows) on the paper with a marker and cut out the shapes. You can use the cut outs to create a face on the outside of your container and stow the extra cut outs in the inside of the lid.
