Program - The Hidden Life of Streams: Leaf Packs

Thursday, November 10, 2011 at 7:00 PM at the Holy Nativity Lutheran Church, Wenonah, NJ (Annual joint meeting with The South Jersey Land & Water Trust)

Streams are dynamic environments, with variation in flow, temperature and food quality. Autumn leaffall is an event of huge importance to the life of streams. As leaves fall from overhanging trees and shrubs into streams, they collect and accumulate with other small floating debris (twigs, bark, seeds, flowers), forming natural leaf packs. These packs get lodged against rocks or other obstructions and begin to decay. Leaf packs provide food and habitat for an array of stream organisms, including many aquatic forms of insects that often go unnoticed because of their size and habits. Assessing the abundance and variety of these organisms in leaf-packs can tell us something about habitat and water quality. Join Erik and Kris Mollenhauer in a look at the hidden life of streams: attendees will work in small groups with low-power microscopes and other tools to explore an actual leaf-pack.

Directions: The Holy Nativity Lutheran Church is located just off Rt 553 (Woodbury-Glassboro Rd.) immediately south of the traffic light at Mantua Ave. The church parking lot can be accessed by entrances on either Woodbury-Glassboro Road or Lenape Trail (first left off of Mantua Ave).

<u>Field Trip – Birding at Forsythe National Wildlife Refuge</u> Sunday November 13, 2011 8:30 AM to Mid-afternoon Trip Leader: Jonathan Stillwell



Forsythe NWR is an important site on the Atlantic Flyway for southbound migrants during November. Snow geese, migratory passerines, dunlin and other waders are species that can be seen there at this time of year. The trees will have mostly shed their leaves and the bugs will have eased their assault by this date.

We will meet at the information center at 8:30 AM and briefly survey for woodland birds, then drive the 8-mile loop to view autumn migrants on the salt marsh beside the bay. The loop affords excellent close views of the birds on the marsh. There are also short hiking trails and boardwalks and observation towers for viewing. Afterwards we will have lunch at the picnic area, then continue to one or more nearby less-known nature spots: Scott's Landing, the Galloway Tract, and Absecon WMA.

Directions: Take the AC Expressway to Exit 5 and take Route 9 north for 6.3 miles. Turn right at the light for "Great Creek Road" and go 0.8 miles to the parking area. There is a \$4.00 per vehicle entrance fee. Bring lunch, binoculars, and scopes, and have clothing for windy conditions.

Carpooling is encouraged. Meet at the north end of the parking lot for Boscov's Department Store on Clements Bridge Road in Deptford at 7:30 AM.

Field Trip Report – Amico Island Birding, October 8

About 40 species of birds were seen on this morning trip to 55-acre Amico Island, a Burlington County park at the confluence of Rancocas Creek and the Delaware River. This included six species of warblers, including Tennessee, Nashville, blackpoll, and magnolia in addition to common yellowthroat and hundreds of yellow-rumps. Also seen were bald eagle, belted kingfisher, and osprey. A few butterflies and late-blooming wildflowers were taken note of. We walked about two miles on wide, level mowed trails. The weather was lovely – a cool, bright, late summer day, with just a few hints of autumn foliage. The trip was very ably led by Gary and Marge Lizzi.
