

Join photographer Susan Puder as she takes an intimate look at the resident and visiting bird species that inhabit the shores, fields, and forests of New Jersey. The state's geographic position along the Atlantic flyway provides the opportunity to see a great variety of species at different times of the year. A natural haven for birds, mammals, amphibians, and reptiles, New Jersey offers ample viewing opportunities for photographers and nature lovers alike. Whether a casual or serious birder or a photographer, this 40 minute multi-media slide show will give you a sense of the great diversity in habitats and species that can be found in New Jersey all year round. Susan will offer for sale and sign her books after the program.

Susan Puder has been a serious nature and wildlife photographer for over 30 years, using Nikon equipment. Her work has been exhibited in New York City and throughout New Jersey, winning many photo competitions, including the New Jersey Federation of Camera Club's TOPS in New Jersey. Her work has been published in Digital Imaging and AAA World magazines, local newspapers, and other local publications. She is a Field Contributor to Nature Photographer Magazine, with articles published in the Spring and Winter 2012 issues. She is both a judge and presenter for the New Jersey Federation of Camera Clubs.



Susan is a dedicated environmentalist who supports the preservation of open lands and wildlife. As an avid birder, she started the Southern Ocean Birding Group, located at the Tuckerton Seaport in Tuckerton, New Jersey, and is a member of the New Jersey Audubon Society. **Directions:** The Wenonah Community Center (historic train station) is located at the RR crossing at the corner of E. Mantua Avenue and N. East Avenue, Wenonah, NJ.

**From the east, north or south**, take Woodbury-Glassboro Rd (Rt. 553), and turn west at the light onto Mantua Avenue. The Community Center is approximately 1/2 of a mile ahead on the right (at the railroad crossing).

**From the west,** take Wenonah Ave. in Mantua east for approximately a mile (becomes Mantua Ave. when you enter Wenonah) to the RR crossing. The Community center is on the left. There are small parking lots near the Community Center along East Ave and West Ave, plus additional parking is available along the surrounding streets.

## <u>Field Trip – Special Inversand Fossil Pit Visit</u>

To all members and friends of the Gloucester County Nature Club,

The Mantua Twp. Economic Development Office and Inversand have extended an invitation to the members and friends of the GCNC to attend the Fossil Day event at the Inversand fossil pit in Sewell on Friday, Nov. 15th. This is one of the richest and most scientifically significant sites in the eastern US and one of the few sites in the world that contains fossils from the time of the dinosaur mass extinction event 65 million years ago.

The program will include a talk by Dr. Kenneth Lacovara, fossil displays, an interactive fossil workshop and a visit to the dig at the bottom of the pit. Participants will be able to dig for fossils using plastic implements. The content of the program will be balanced for adults as well as young people. This is a structured program that lasts from 10 to 2. Although local students will also be participating, our interests will be accommodated and we will not need to participate in all activities. We can leave at any time and do not need to commit to being there until 2PM. We are slotted for 20 persons but if more wish to take part, they will be accommodated. **We should arrive at the site by 9:30 AM.** 

All participants will need to be able to walk unaided into and out of the pit. There will be no shuttles or people movers. The terrain is a bit uneven, the walk out a bit steep and there is a small wooden bridge in the dig area where there is seepage. It is not extremely challenging but people need to be aware.

## Field Trip Report - Duke Farms 10/19/13-

Six nature lovers ventured north just above Princeton and visited Duke Farms on a spectacular October day. Our visit started at the visitor's center watching a beautifully done short movie explaining the site's history and evolution from merely a stipulation in Doris Dukes' will to establish a nature preserve in the face of suburban sprawl in the nation's most densely populated state to embracing a vision to be a model of environmental stewardship to inspire people to start building a more sustainable future. The displays and video told the story of how the property has used sustainable restoration and management techniques. These include: buildings architecturally designed to use natural light effectively and collect rainwater to recycle; solar and geothermal energy that provide all the power the property needs; plantings of native plants, rain gardens, grasslands and pollinator habitat.

On our self-guided tour we alternately walked the trails and rode the tram (to most efficiently use our time -there is much more to explore here than you can see in one visit) to "hit the highlights". We watched millions of gallons of water pumped from the Raritan River flow down the Great Falls, checked out the ruins of a mansion started but never completed above the foundation line, visited the arboretum housing thousands of orchid varieties and identified or tried to identify plants, trees, birds, butterflies and insects as we went. Duke Farms acknowledges it is a work in progress and has done a world class job. It is truly inspiring and offers much for all of us to take away to apply to our individual lives as well as to our efforts as a club maintaining our natural areas in Gloucester County and preserving new ones.

## <u>Conservation Corner – 5 Simple Things YOU Can Do To Help Protect The Earth</u>

- 1. Put on a sweater. Remember when you turn up the heat in wintertime, your furnace is probably burning fossil fuels. A sweater or a nice warm robe will keep you even warmer and will help conserve resources and reduce climate change.
- 2. Put one foot in front of the other. One hundred years ago, 99.9% of people got by without cars. They **took** the train, they lived near the workplaces...and they walked. Using fuel-efficient cars is important, but we can save more fuel by simply driving less.



- 3. Go for seconds. Recycling doesn't mean only separating cans and bottles. It can mean using things a second time (or a third time). That nice padded envelope you got in the mail, for example? Instead of throwing it away, scratch out the address, tear off the off the stamps and use it again.
- 4. Watch your waste. Items you may be throwing out can contaminate the soil and water for thousands or millions of years. Your community probably has special disposal procedures for things like used oil and batteries. Ink cartridges can probably be recycled where you bought them. And many of the new superefficient light bulbs contain mercury, so proper disposal is crucial. Check with the store where you buy them.
- 5. Paper nor Plastic. Bring your bags with you! By taking reusable bags to the grocery store, you can cut down on the 350 bags the average American uses each year and reduce needless deaths of marine life caused by plastic bags that end up in streams, rivers, and oceans.

These are just a few tips to conserve with your family and friends.

#### **Reminder - Membership Dues**

It's the time of year for membership renewals. Please remember that your dues are the only costs associated with being a club member, we do not charge for any of our programs or field trips. Many organizations charge their members for each walk or activity they attend. We were able to maintain the same dues structure since 2004. However, to help close a persistent deficit in the club's operations, the executive committee has found it necessary to increase membership dues by \$5 for the new club year (September 2013 - August 2014). **Electronic (email) memberships will now be \$20 per household per year, while postal mail memberships will be \$25.** For this modest sum, you will be supporting our full slate of meetings and outings, as well as our efforts to preserve and promote the natural areas that make our local communities special. We have been able to keep all of these activities open to the public for almost 65 years thanks to your continued financial support. We believe that the club is still an excellent value and hope the added cost will not deter any of our members.
