The Cherokee called these ancient mountains the "land of a thousand smokes" They have a beauty and a majesty that can be awe inspiring. The scale of their wonders is both vast and panoramic and as diminutive as a delicate woodland wildflower. The Smokies and its peoples have experienced and suffered much. Once a part of the lands of the Cherokee nation, the Smokies saw the Cherokee forced from their homes in the tragic Trail of Tears. These ancient mountains saw the coming of the white settlers in the early nineteenth century, whose traditional mountain culture lingered

in these hills well into the 1930's. They saw forests cleared for farming and pasturage, then the coming of the lumber companies who ravaged the forest, creating desolation. And finally in 1934, the Great Smoky Mountains National Park, one of America's great parks, was created to preserve the natural diversity and cultural heritage of this unique region of the Southern Appalachians.

The Great Smokies have an amazing diversity of wildlife and plant life. They have been called the salamander capitol of the world with 30 species found in the park. With their topographical features, geology and their mild and wet climate producing a wide variety of habitats, the Smokies are home to over 1,500 species plants, including over 100 species of trees and shrubs, 30 species of orchids and 10

species of trilliums. Every April the forest floor, the meadows, the creek sides and the valleys and hillsides come alive with white fringed phacelia, showy orchis, crested iris, yellow trillium, fire pink and so many more for that brief period between the ending of winter and the leafing out of the forest canopy. Tonight, Rich Dilks will guide us along the late April trails and roadsides of the Great Smoky Mountains to view its flora and to learn something of the natural history and human history of one of America's great places.


Directions: The Holy Nativity Lutheran Church is located just off Rt 553 (Woodbury-Glassboro Rd.) immediately south of the traffic light at Mantua Ave. The church parking lot can be accessed by entrances on either Woodbury-Glassboro Road or Lenape Trail (first left off of Mantua Ave).

Field Trip - Guided Hike of Saddler's Woods

Join us for a walking tour of Saddler's Woods, a 25 acre urban forest located in Haddon Township that contains old growth forest, young woodlands, meadow areas, and the headwaters of Newton Creek. Saddler's Woods is one of the last remaining old growth forests in the Eastern U.S. with beech and oak trees over 200 years old. This area gives us a glimpse of what the woods would have looked like when the Lenni Lenape inhabited the area prior to European settlement. This land is part of a historic area named for escaped slave Joshua Saddler who escaped a Maryland Plantation by way of



the Underground Railroad. He settled on the land which is now preserved. We will tour the woods with a member of the Saddler's Woods Conservation Association; this private non-profit is dedicated to education, research, and to the area's restoration. The group asks for a \$2 donation when touring the woods with a guide, monies raised are used to further their mission. Come hear the history of this special place, how it was preserved, and about the concepts of Old Growth, Edge Effect and Invasive Species.

Address for GPS: 250 MacArthur Blvd., Haddon Township (may come up as Collingswood)

Driver's Directions: From Rt. 295 North take exit 29B to US 30 West (White Horse Pike). Travel 2.4 miles, then turn right onto Cuthbert Blvd. Go about a half mile, then turn right at the first traffic light onto MacArthur Blvd. Continue down MacArthur Boulevard just past the entrance to Westmont Plaza. Saddler's Woods is on your right. Parking is available on the street.

Despite a light early morning rain, the weather cleared by the 1:00pm start time and remained nearly perfect all afternoon. The trees cooperated too, as the Autumn colors were out in full force.

It is not expected that the film or guide will be available until possibly late winter. But when it is nearing completion and a date set for release, a first screening will likely be scheduled for one evening in Wenonah.
