Program – The Hawks of Southern New Jersey

Hawk is a general term for diurnal birds of prey in the family, Accipitridae (and the Osprey- the only member of the monotypic family, Pandionidae). Included in this grouping are Accipiters, Buteos, and Falcons. Fourteen species of hawks regularly occur in New Jersey, either migrating through, breeding or wintering in Southern New Jersey. Hawks are strong, powerful birds. Their feet are equipped with sharp, curved talons for capturing prey, and their strong beaks are hooked for biting and tearing flesh. Swift fliers, some hawks can attain speeds of over 150 mph when diving. Some species undertake long migrational journeys, traveling thousands of miles each year - a testimony to their strength and stamina. Their sense of hearing is excellent, and their eyesight the best in the entire animal world. Not only can hawks see greater distances than humans, but their visual acuity (the ability to see clearly) is eight times that of ours. Tonight we will learn about these handsome and intelligent birds that grace our skies from the prominent and vocal Red Tail, New Jersey's most common hawk, to the diminutive Kestrel and the Rough-legged hawk, a rare winter visitor.

Our presenter will be expert birder and naturalist, Don Frieday of New Jersey Audubon's Cape May Bird Observatory. Those of you that were fortunate to hear Don's January 2009 presentation to the GCNC on the Owls of New Jersey know we can look forward to a program presented with knowledge and enthusiasm and to an evening that will be informative and entertaining.

Directions: The Holy Nativity Lutheran Church is located just off Rte 553 (Woodbury Glassboro Rd.) immediately south of the traffic light at Mantua Ave. The church parking lot can be accessed by entrances on either Woodbury-Glassboro Road or Lenape Trail (first left off of Mantua Ave).

Field Trip – Biking through Glassboro Woods

The recent warm weather has made everyone itch to get outside for some fresh air and exercise. Join us for this family friendly bike trip from Glassboro to Williamstown the “secret” way on a paved path. We will ride through woods, open fields, and suburban neighborhoods along this converted railroad bed. The newer portion of this trail where we start provides access to great habitat in the spectacular Glassboro Woods WMA. Searching for early spring migrants, we say farewell to some of our winter friends. Bring binoculars to enjoy the birds . . . Are the wood thrush back? Do you hear blue-winged warblers? Have the Phoebe started their nests yet? We will break for all spring wildflowers. . .

Can you find Dutchman’s breeches? Do you see any trout lilies? What else might be there? The trip is about 6 miles long and we will travel up and back (12 miles) on the paved path. You must provide your own bikes.

Directions: We will meet just off of Route 47 between the Robins Nest and Grove St. in Glassboro. From Clayton take Rt 47 (Delsea Dr) North. After Grove St. (on your left) make the next right, you will pass the bike path on your right and park along the path on the street. From Glassboro take Rt 47 (Delsea Dr.) South. After Rt 322 heads East take the first left and park along the bike path on the street.

Field Trip Report – Manasquan Reservoir, March 20, 2010

Birds seen during this trip included bald eagle (at a nest); osprey (also at a nest); six species of waterfowl; and a pair of bluebirds, apparently just-arrived from their winter quarters, who immediately upon getting “on territory” began to investigate a nesting box. Other vertebrates seen included eastern painted turtle and a somewhat out-of-normal-habitat diamondback terrapin. Mourning cloak and eastern comma butterflies were seen. The weather was absolutely perfect. The environmental center is one of the best in New Jersey, with a nice array of well-maintained displays, plus some live fish, reptiles, and amphibians. The Manasquan Reservoir is part of the Monmouth County Park System. Too bad there is nothing like it in Gloucester County.

Directions: From Exit 21 on I-295, take Delaware Avenue west. In about 0.4 mile, cross Grove Street. Continue for another 0.3 mile, on what is then called Riverwinds Drive. Watch for a sign to the trail, on the right. Meet in the parking lot.

Gloucester County Bird Quest: Saturday May 1, 2010

The Gloucester County Nature Club and many area businesses, industries, and local environmental commissions invite people of all ages to participate in the **2010 (Eleventh Annual) Gloucester County Bird Quest**. The **2009 Bird Quest** will take place on **Sat., May 1, 2010 from 7 AM to 12 noon in Gloucester County**.

From 7 AM to 12 noon teams visit parks and natural sites in Gloucester County and find as many different bird species as they can. The Quest is:

- A way to discover Gloucester County's parks and natural areas
- A way to discover the unique birds that live in and through our county
- A chance to learn how to identify birds by sight, sound, behavior, and habitat
- A chance to have fun with friends and colleagues
- A light-hearted competition

The rules are simple: Identify as many different bird species as you can between 7am and noon staying within the boundary of Gloucester County. You can participate in one of the following ways:

Form a team, plan your route (locations you will visit) for the day of the event and record all the bird species you see within Gloucester County. Hand in your results at Atkinson Park no later than 12:30 to be eligible for prizes.

Join a bus led by a bird expert. These buses will visit a few locations in the County where bird experts will help you to identify the many bird species. At each stop, participants walk with the expert birder to explore a natural area and discover the local bird life. The buses will meet back at Atkinson Park between noon and 12:30 PM.

Participate in our guided walks led by a bird expert who will help you identify the bird species. These walks will be paced and placed so you can participate in all of the walks or just one or two while you spend the rest of the time birding on your own.

Guided Walks

7:00-8:30: Field of Dreams, West Deptford Township

Directions: From Interstate 295, Exit 21, take Crown Point Road (Rt 44) West . Drive for approximately .25 miles and take a right onto River Road. Park in the lot.

9:00-10:30: Chestnut Branch Park, Mantua Township

Directions: From the intersection of Rt 45 (Broad Street) and Cooper Street in Woodbury, go south on Rt 45 for 4.2miles. Turn left (from right hand lane) onto Rt 553Alt (Main Street) in Mantua. Go south on Rt 553Alt for 1.6 miles. The park entrance will be on the left. There is a large paved parking area. Meet at the wildflower garden.

11:00-12:00: Washington Lake Park, Washington Township

Directions: From the intersection of Rt 47 and Hurffville-Cross Keys Road (Rt. 654) in Hurffville, go southeast on Hurffville-Cross Keys Road for 1.2 miles. The park entrance will be on the right. Follow the main road past several playing fields and parking lots. Park in Lot E, just past the Amphitheater.

No matter how you participate, everyone meets at Atkinson Park between noon and 12:30 to hand in their results (total number of bird species seen that day from 7am to noon), share stories, activities, games, and for a free lunch. The emphasis of this event is on learning and sharing, not on the competition. Everyone who participates receives a t-shirt and is eligible for a variety of prizes.

Drawing on the popularity of last year this year we will again be having games and activities at Atkinson Park for the children as well as live animals they can see up close.

The day will culminate in a presentation from a wildlife handler from Woodford Cedar Run Wildlife Refuge who will have live birds and animals. They will discuss what these animals eat, where they sleep, and the habits and habitats of each species. The cost to participate is \$12 per person. In addition, you can purchase additional t-shirts, bird identification flash cards (\$4), or "The Natural Places of Gloucester County" book (\$12) created by the Nature Club to promote the natural beauty of our County which will help you identify birds or locations to visit during the event.

You say you don't know one bird from another? The Gloucester County Nature Club offers a series of training sessions in the weeks leading up to the event itself to teach you everything from the basics of bird watching to identifying birds not by sight but by their songs or calls. These trainings are worthwhile even if you already know how to identify birds. They can help you discover the natural places of Gloucester County as well. During the trainings you will visit some of the many local places where you can enjoy nature anytime of the year. These locations are perfect for photography of animals and plants of Gloucester County.

We are always looking for people who are willing to help with this event. We need volunteers willing to coordinate teams, t-shirt distribution, record tallying, and help the day of BirdQuest with site preparations, food pickup, cleanup, or as an experienced birder who could help teams identify birds. Natural Events for the month of April

- Pond turtles emerge from hibernation and bask in the sun.
- Spring beauty, bloodroot, and trout lily bloom on the floor of deciduous woodlands.
- Spring peepers and wood frogs begin calling when vernal ponds warm to about 50 degrees F.
- Shad migrate up the Delaware River to spawn.
- Ruby-throated hummingbirds, purple martins, and warblers begin to arrive.
- Most juncos and white-throated sparrows have left by the end of the month.
- Rose-breasted grosbeaks show up at feeders for a few days before heading north.
- Prairie warbler, misnamed when it was first found in a barren area in Kentucky, returns late April – mid May.
- The peak of spring raptor migration is mid- to late-April. Consider a visit to a hawk lookout.
- Red-winged blackbirds return to marshes.
