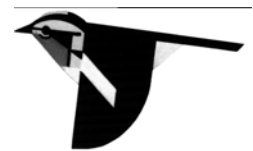
**Raptor Project – Pitman High School Auditorium, 225 Linden Ave., Pitman**

The Raptor Project: a close encounter with 15-20 different kinds of LIVE EAGLES, HAWKS, OWLS and FALCONS. Raptor Project stars include “Cody” (a Golden Eagle with a seven foot wing-span), “Snowman” (an Arctic Snowy Owl), “Paragon” (a Peregrine Falcon) and “Tiny Tina” a Saw-whet Owl. This is the largest and most varied collection of traveling raptors in the world. The presenter and Project Director, Jonathan Wood, is a Master Falconer and Wildlife Rehabilitator, bringing unique insights, observations and humor to this nationally acclaimed show. His program emphasizes awareness of the vital role of raptors in the environment, their conservation, rehabilitation (of injured birds) and captive breeding programs (to re-establish endangered species). Great for families. Last year this program drew an audience of 350! **(back by popular demand!)**

### **2002 Bird Quest Expected to Draw More Participants than Last Year**

The **2002 Gloucester County Bird Quest** will take place on **Sat., May 4, 2002 from 7 AM to 12 NOON in Gloucester County**. During this time, teams of people visit parks and natural sites in Gloucester County and find as many different bird species as they can. The purpose of the Bird Quest is to discover the natural areas of Gloucester

County, to learn how to identify birds by sight and sound, and to have fun with friends, colleagues and family. **The Quest is an educational event, novices are encouraged to participate.** At 12 NOON, all participants gather at Atkinson Memorial County Park on Delsea Drive to report results, and for a **free lunch, t-shirts and prizes.**

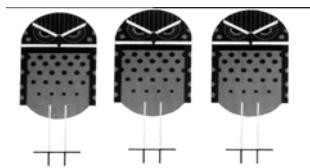
**Free refreshments will be provided at the first stop of the morning (with free lunch and T-shirts at noon.)**

Last year's **Gloucester County Bird Quest** attracted nearly 300 participants, including teachers, school groups, scout troops, environmental commissions, families and residents of Gloucester and neighboring counties. This year

the organizers are planning for at least 400 participants.

The **2002 Gloucester County Bird Quest** highlights the importance of International Migratory Bird Day (IMBD), a nation-wide effort to draw attention to the plight and needs of migratory birds. The 2002 IMBD theme, "A *Celebration of Special Places*", stresses the importance of stopover sites habitat to migratory birds. The colorful IMBD T-shirt showing 42 different bird species migrating at night is given free to all participants.

A county map and other materials are provided to each registered team. Participants can also attend any of a series of twelve free field trainings (listed below) in the two weeks before the Quest. **Environmental Info/Nature Notes – April, 2002****Gloria Caccia, Environmental Coordinator, 582-0980****Preserved Lands Tour**

South Jersey Land Trust (SJLT) is holding its first annual Preserved Lands Tour on Saturday, June 1, 2002. The tour of two sites will be led by eminent naturalist/author Clay Sutton. Clay has served on the Board of Trustees of the South Jersey Land Trust since its inception in 1990. Both locations offer opportunities for birding and botanical experiences.

Cedar Lake Preserve is a 114-acre property in the Great Egg Harbor Watershed within Monroe and Buena Townships. It was preserved in 1997 through the joint efforts of SJLT and Green Acres. NJ Fish and Wildlife manages the land. SJLT is presently in the last phase of a wetlands restoration project to revert two lake habitats to wetlands. The second site, the MacKannan Property (previously Camp Kimble Boy Scout Camp), is a forty-acre woodland on Oldman's Creek, and is a preservation effort in progress. SJLT recently received a Green Acres grant to preserve habitats within the Raccoon and Oldman's Creek Watersheds and is actively pursuing several sites.

The Cedar Lake tour will run from 9:30 to 11AM. The MacKannan tour will run from Noon to 1:30PM. A brown bag lunch is suggested while we learn about the Raccoon and Oldman's Creeks Watersheds Project under the shade of old beech trees. **VOLUNTEERS NEEDED  
at Supawna Meadows National Wildlife Refuge  
Salem County, NJ**



Located along the Delaware and Salem Rivers in Salem County, Supawna Meadows National Wildlife Refuge is the closest national wildlife refuge to Gloucester County. The refuge consists primarily of brackish tidal marsh and adjacent upland woodlands and fields. The refuge needs volunteers for a number of special projects listed below. It is also helpful for people to come in once a week or once a month to help with office work (e.g., photocopying, typing, filing, etc.). If you are interested in volunteering call the refuge office at 856-935-1487, ask for Linda Ziemba for the biological program and Pat DiDomizio for the maintenance program.

### **Songbird Nest Box Surveys**

*Check the refuge's 25 songbird nest boxes April through August! We will train volunteers in nest/egg identification and proper completion of field data sheets.*

### **Wood Duck Nest Box Survey**

*There are 110 wood duck nest boxes on the refuge that need to be checked each winter. You can check all of them or just a few. We will train volunteers in nest/egg identification and proper completion of field data sheets. We also need handy people to repair and maintain these boxes.*

### **Pea Patch Island Flightline Surveys**

*We need volunteers to stand at the end of the pier at Fort Mott State Park and identify and count the wading birds flying between New Jersey and Pea Patch Island one evening per month from February to August.*

### **Purple Loosestrife Control**

*We need volunteers to help control the invasive plant purple loosestrife (*Lythrum salicaria*) by cutting and removing*

*the plants during late June, July, and August.*

### **Trail Construction**

*During the Spring and Summer of 2002, we are building a universally accessible trail from the parking lot on Lighthouse Road to a wooden wildlife observation platform over a pond with a universally accessible ramp. We need volunteers to assist with all aspects of trail construction.*

### **Trail Maintenance**

*We need volunteers to maintain trails on the refuge by filling in low areas of stoned trails, removing overhanging branches, weed wacking, replacing rotted lumber, and nailing decking boards.*

### **Grounds Maintenance**

We need volunteers to:

- I. Paint, repair, and maintain wildlife observation platforms.
- II. Mow grass, weed wack, and trim and prune shrubs and trees.
- III. Assist staff members with boundary posting along the river.
- IV. Assist with road maintenance and trash removal.

### **General Maintenance**

*We need volunteers to assist with small engine repairs and equipment maintenance.*
