
Save the Date: Field Trip: Stream Stomp, Monday, July 28

BIRD QUEST 2025: The 25th edition of Bird Quest featured warmer-than-normal weather, with temperatures well up into



(Tyler Savage, Kevin Savage, and Nevaeh Lyons) with 99 species. There was a tie for second place, with Wenonah Warblers (Dan & Maria Ceravolo and Rita McIntyre) and Saw What Owls? (Erik, Kellan, and Mark Nelson) each finding 85 species.

This year's species were even more diverse than last year's: 17 species were found by 90% or more of the teams, while 24 species were found by 80% or more of the teams. None of these common species would be surprising, but there has been a noticeable shift in observed crow populations. American Crows were found more often than Fish Crows during the 2021-2024 events. This year the situation was reversed: American Crows were found by 69% of teams while Fish Crows were found by 88% of teams.

As we are accumulating more data year by year, some species numbers are relatively steady while others fluctuate due to weather, the places visited by our participants, or other unknowable factors. Here are a few differences from last year that stood out:

There was only one species not found in 2021-2024 that was found by two teams this year: Red-throated Loon. Of course, this could be caused by a single bird in the right place at the right time to be counted! (Birds that sleep in late on Saturday mornings are definitely missing out.) Other species new to our count this year were: Willow Flycatcher, Little Blue Heron, Forster's Tern, Summer Tanager, and Mississippi Kite.

The coordinator (Scott Barnes) would like to thank the sponsors, the participants, those who attended the 12 training walks, and especially the volunteers that made everything tick. From the training walk leaders, to the day-of walk leaders, to those who donated door prizes and helped with various aspects of the Wheelabrator gathering: there are too many to name individually but know that your efforts are the vital glue that has kept this event going strong for a quarter-century!

Meeting: Our members are encouraged and invited to help plan next year's programs for our monthly meetings and suggest topics for our program coordinator to explore.
